2024-2025 Kindergarten Registration Kickoff

Kindergarten <u>registration</u> for families of children who will be 5 years old by September 1, 2024, kicks off Monday, March 4. Parents can begin the enrollment process online, after which your child's school will contact you to complete the registration process. Current HCPSS prekindergarten students do not need to be re-registered for kindergarten because they are already enrolled as an HCPSS student.

NEWS WORTH REPEATING

Health Room Reminders

Deciding when a child is too sick to go to school can be a difficult decision for parents to make. When trying to decide, use the guidelines below to help you. **Stay at Home**: If your child has any of the following symptoms, please keep your child at home or make appropriate child care arrangements:

- **Appearance and Behavior** unusually tired, pale, lack of appetite, difficult to wake, confused or irritable. This is sufficient reason to exclude a child.
- **Eyes** thick mucus or pus draining from the eye or pink eye. With pink eye (conjunctivitis) you may see a white or yellow discharge, matted eyelids after sleep, eye pain and/or redness.
- **Fever** temperature 100 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. Remember that a child must be fever free for 24 hours before returning to school.
- **Greenish nose discharge and/or chronic cough** should be seen by a healthcare provider. These conditions may be contagious and require treatment.
- Sore throat especially with fever or swollen glands in the neck. (With strep throat, the child may return to school after 24 hours on antibiotics.)
- **Diarrhea** three (3) or more watery stools in a 24-hour period, especially if the child acts or looks ill.
- **Vomiting** vomiting two (2) or more times within the past 24 hours
- **Rash** body rash, especially with fever or itching. Heat rashes and allergic reactions are not contagious.
- Ear infections without fever do not need to be excluded, but the child needs to get medical treatment and follow-up. Untreated ear infections can cause permanent hearing loss.
- Lice children may not return to school until they have been treated and are free of live lice. Make a habit of checking your child's hair for head lice once a week.
- **COVID** Students who are positive for Covid should isolate at home through at least day 5 (day 0 is the day symptoms appeared or the date the specimen was collected for the positive test for people who are asymptomatic). They should wear a mask through day 10 while at school. Students must be 24 hours fever free to return to school.
 - The Maryland Department of Health and Maryland State Department of Education recommend that schools and child care programs follow the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Operational Guidance for K-12 Schools and Early Care and Education Programs for the 2023-2024 school year.

If your child shows any of the above symptoms at school, it will be necessary to pick them up from school. Please make sure to update your emergency contacts so that you can pick up your student within an hour of notification from the health room. Student Technology Reminder - Personal Devices

Recently, we have noticed an increase in the number of students bringing personal technology devices to school. These include cell phones, Apple watches, Gizmo watches, and other personal devices that include text messaging capabilities. These items have been disruptive to classroom instruction, therefore, we wanted to uplift the HCPSS Policy regarding personal technology devices in elementary schools:

<u>HCPSS Policy 8080</u> - Responsible Use of Technology, Digital Tools, and Social Media states that elementary school students "will keep personal technology devices in backpacks during the school day, unless otherwise authorized by school administrators or instructional staff."

If your child has a personal device, please review this policy with them. As stated in Policy 8080, students who bring these devices to school will be instructed to place them in their backpacks for the duration of the school day. Thank you for your partnership.

Cold Weather Reminder

As cold winter weather approaches, we want to remind you that students will still be going outside for recess. Please make sure you send your child to school with warm clothes. All clothing should be labeled with your child's name. Below you will find the HCPSS criteria we consider when having outdoor activities.

- Temperature and humidity
- Wind chill
- Heat index and air quality
- Age of students
- Length of time outdoors
- Adequacy of the children's clothing
- Condition of the playground
- Falling precipitation (more than a sprinkle or mist)
- Thunder and lightning

Generally, it is assumed that students will be outside for recess, physical education, or any other outdoor activity when the temperature combined with the wind chill is not less than 20 degrees Fahrenheit or the heat index reading is less than 95.

HCPSS Emergency Notifications

As we head into winter weather, families are reminded that in emergency situations (including inclement weather), information will be shared with the community only through the HCPSS website, email and text, Twitter and the HCPSS weather hotline. Be sure your Family File is up to date and that you have opted into texts to receive emergency messages.

Volunteer Training Required for Volunteers and Visitors

Anyone volunteering at school in any capacity, including parents joining their children for lunch, are required to complete volunteer training prior to their first visit. Attendance/Reporting Absences

Parents can email <u>DOESabsence@hcpss.org</u> to report a student's absence. Please include your child(ren)'s full name, parent's/guardian's full name and phone number, the date your child(ren) was absent and the reason. Parents may instead choose to send in a paper excuse note to their child's teacher with the same information when the student returns to school.

For families requesting local discretionary absences, please complete a <u>Local Discretionary</u> <u>Absence Request Form</u> and submit it to the front office at least one week in advance.
